Talk to God

Pope St. John Paul II thought prayer was so important that he dedicated a year to the Rosary. Pope Benedict XVI directed these beautiful words to Americans during his visit in 2008: "Contemplation of the mysteries of the Rosary releases all their saving power, and it conforms, unites and consecrates us to Jesus Christ." Pope Francis, since his election, has spoken of prayer, too. "The Christian life is not limited to prayer, but requires an ongoing dedication and courage born of prayer," he tweeted during World Youth Day Rio 2013.

"Pray for peace!" he proclaimed Sept. 7, 2013, via Twitter, the day he joined thousands in St. Peter's Square to pray for peace in the wake of the Syria

Prayer can be thought of according to the acronym ACTS: A-Adoration C-Contrition (sorrow for sins) T-Thanksgiving S-Supplication (special inten-



The Rosary

The Basic Rosary

1. Holding the crucifix, make the Sign of the Cross

2. Recite the Apostles' Creed (See EWTN.com/devotionals/prayers/ creed2.htm.)

Quick Tip Reflect on a Scripture such as a saint's writings. What do the words remind you to talk with God about? What intentions

3. Pray the Our Father, three Hail Marys (for the virtues of faith, hope and love) and the Glory Be. 4. Holding the fifth bead up from the crucifix, announce the first mystery/read a reflection on it, and pray an Our Father.

5. While meditating on the mystery, pray 10 Hail Marys, one on each bead. End with a Glory Be. (You may also pray the Fatima Prayer at the end of each decade: O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell; lead all souls to heaven, especially those who are in most need of thy mercy.)

Quick Tip It's okay to sit with God in silence, especially in front of the Blessed Sacrament. Jesus is there with you.

6. Continue with the second, third. fourth and fifth mysteries in the same way.

7. Pray the Hail, Holy Queen: Hail, holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us; and after this, our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God, that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

8. Pray the Rosary Prayer: O God,

Quick Tip Familiar prayers like the Our Father and Hail Mary are great prayers. But also pray in your own

whose only begotten Son, by his life, death and resurrection, has purchased for us

the rewards of eternal life: Grant, we beseech thee, that, while meditating on these mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may both imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

9. End with the Sign of the Cross.

Quick Tip Mary's intercession is powerful. Pray the *Memorare* in times of need: Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known, that anyone who thy help or sought thy intercession was left unaided. Inspired by this confidence, I fly unto thee, O Virgin of virgins, my mother; to thee do I come; before thee I stand, sinful and sorrowful. O Mother of the Word Incarnate, despise not my petitions, but in thy mercy hea and answer me. Amen.



■ attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation and reserve those days as much as possible for

■ confess your sins at least once a year (though our confession guide highlighted the benefits of frequent confession, as encouraged by Pope Francis and past popes);

■ receive the Eucharist at least during the Easter season (although our Mass guide denoted the importance of receiving Christ in Communion regularly):

■ observe the days of fasting (Ash Wednesday; Good Friday) and abstinence (Fridays) established by the Church; and

■ help to provide for the needs of the Church.

Good Catholic reads: the Bible (Catholic version), Catechism of the Catholic Church, the Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church (the shorter Vatican Catechism in question-and answer format) and YouCat (the youth Catechism)

Season 1 Advent focuses on preparation. The four Sundays and their corresponding weeks before Christmas are a blessed time period. Pray amid the festivities and shopping.



Season 2 The Christmas season begins on Christmas Day (or anticipatory Christmas Eve vigil) and ends on the Baptism of the Lord in January. Celebrate fully the 12 Days of Christmas and beyond.

Season 3 Lent is the penitential season from Ash Wednesday to Palm Sunday. Include a prayerful penance in your routine: daily Rosary or daily Mass.

Season 4 The Easter season proclaims Christ's resurrection, the foundation of our faith. We recall Easter every Sunday. Reserve Sundays for your family and the Lord.
