## Meet the Miracle Boy Saved By Fulton Sheen's Prayers

hat could be a more h e a r t w a r m i n g, inspiring, triumphant story than one about a baby brought back to life from the dead? What is more incredible than a baby healed of abnormalities in a way medical science could not explain, except for doctors and nurses to say, many times over, "He shouldn't be like this. It's amazing. ... It's astounding and really, really wonderful ... I'd say a miracle"?

The story of James Fulton Engstrom, the child, became the miracle that assured the beatification of Archishop Fulton Sheen, which the Church will celebrate Dec. 21. His mother, Bonnie Engstrom, describes the events with such moving, sometimes heart-wrenching, surprising, unexpected and ultimately uplifting and triumphant detail in her book *61 Minutes to a Miracle* that her son's story should make even an unbeliever in the miracle weep with compassion and finally with gratitude and joy for this blessed family.

Another reason why Engstrom's book is so exceptional is that this miracle story is shared in so much detail, covering all pertinent events, from the months before the miracle to years afterward.

Fast-forwarding to the outcome, Engstrom writes, "If you saw my kids and me at the park today, you would never be able to guess which one should, by all accounts, be severely disabled. If you stood behind us in the checkout line, you would never know that one of them had been dead for more than an hour. Unless you knew us and our story, you'd never suspect that my blue-eyed boy was another Lazarus. In fact, unless you saw the two scars on his should-have-beenamputated leg, or the g[astrostomy]tube scar on his belly, you would never assume he had any kind of medical history at all."

Indeed, Bonnie and Travis Eng-

strom faced any parents' worst nightmare. Even if James had come to life 61 minutes after being born, readers learn that without the miracle through the intercession of Archbishop Sheen that continued to unfold, he would have either died very soon after or, if he managed to survive, would have been severely disabled.

But more than recounting facts, Engstrom brings readers into the family as friends with whom she shares all the touching details, the ups and downs of the journey from before James' birth to his miracle, ultimately chosen for Archbishop Sheen's beatification cause. She tells the story in such a personal way — it makes for can't-put-itdown reading.

Page after page, with her natural, conversational style, she draws readers in with genuine emotion, honesty and significant observations. This page-turner relives the events with the family moment by moment.

When during the home birth it was clear the baby was not breathing or responding to emergency treat-

ment, Travis performed an emergency baptism. As Bonnie writes, "Travis looked around the room for water. Taking the cup I had been sipping from throughout labor, he dipped in his fingers and thumb. The water sprinkled down on James's forehead, and with his thumb Travis traced the Sign of the Cross above our son's brow. His voice was soft and clear, even though it was suppressing a great deal of emotion. 'James Fulton, I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.'

"It was the first time that either of us had spoken James's full name. There was power in it, because we had made an intentional decision that every time our children's names are spoken, it will be an invocation of the saints for whom they are named."

There's great truth and beauty in the way faith weaves throughout the unfolding events and circumstances, from the times God's plan could not be understood, but eventually was in hindsight, to times of questioning and uncertainty — bolstered by details, punctuated by amazement and awe, of the Church's centuries-old procedures of investigating miracles.

As Engstrom writes, "At times I still ask myself, 'Why did all this happen, and why did it happen to us?' The simple answer is, I don't know — but to the best of my understanding, everything has been as God wanted it to be. As I once explained it to a friend, 'God set the table.' God put down the linens, laid out the dishes, arranged the flatware, and set out the food. He invited me and my family to join him. All we did was show up and sit down in the chairs he pulled out for us."

This moving story of family life on the edge of heartbreak, buoyed by boundless hope and then ultimately triumphing in life and faith is one to rejoice over. Don't pass it up.

Dig out the old family photo albums. Take the slow time after Christmas to talk about relatives from past generations the kids may never have met.

Tell family stories and share memories from your own Christmases as children. You may have visiting relatives who can chime in with their own versions of family lore. Such tales are treasures to children, little glimpses into your life and how you remember celebrating Christ's birth.

## **Of Notre Dame de Paris and Gardens**

#### Interview About The Girl and the Cathedral

resenting the history of Paris and Notre Dame in a children's book is a delicate work," says the author of the new book The Girl and the Cathedral: The Story of Notre Dame de Paris.

The news of the Notre Dame Cathedral fire in April 2019 stunned not only the Catholics who worshipped there, but people of all faiths around the globe. The Register spoke with author Nicolas Jeter about his response to the devastation, which came in the form of a children's book.

What inspired you to write The Girl and the Cathedral?

I've spent a lot of time in France. I first moved there in 2006, about a year out of high school. I spent two years all over Paris and the northwest of the country, getting to know the people and appreciate the peaceful beauty of the history, architecture and language.

I've been back a couple more times since that first visit, and I've tried to keep up with the language by reading French literature, Victor Hugo in particular.

Also, even though I was born and raised in Texas, both sides of my family tree come through Louisiana, and before that, we were French. The point is: I have a relationship with the country that I value.

When Notre Dame burned earlier this year, my friend David Miles, founder of Bushel & Peck Publishing, called with the idea of coming up with a children's book about Notre Dame. My affection for France is in some ways synonymous with my affection for Notre Dame.

It is literally the first place I went to the morning my plane landed when I moved to France. I've spent hours just staring at the cathedral, trying to memorize it, feeling its oldness.

I'm not an expert by any stretch, but I certainly count myself among those who appreciate and love it.

And David pointed out that there don't seem to be many books that 1) present the story of Notre Dame and 2) are aimed at children. So we started brainstorming how that might look, and I agreed to join the team as the author. I've always wanted to write.

I've always written, even as a small child, but I had never had an opportunity like this, and I was thrilled to be on board.



has such wide appeal beyond the borders of Paris?

I think one direct cause is that Victor Hugo's Notre Dame de Paris [better known in English as The Hunchback of Notre-Dame] carried the story to the world, and we haven't forgotten it.

Another, more broad, answer is that the history of France is the history of the world. Much of the art, literature, philosophy and political thought adopted throughout the world came out of France, so we share significant French symbols like Notre Dame.

As a religious symbol and site, Notre Dame has dominated the imagination and reverence of Christians of all denominations for centuries. It doesn't hurt that Notre Dame is so beautiful.

Tell me about the narrative and why you chose to construct this tale through the perspective of a little girl.

We wanted the story to be sort of an ode to and imitation of [the children's book] The Little Prince by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry, in that the story takes place in a fantastical, ethereal setting where the narrator has an ongoing conversation with the main character.

So we have an unnamed narrator (who is never shown in the story), and he meets a little girl who lives on an island.

She plants a garden, and the garden is Paris, and in that garden she plants her greatest flower, Notre Dame de Paris.

The story is told through the garden, through its flowers, and through the changes and imagery that a garden can show. So the story is at the same time very much a fairy tale and very much an absolutely true story.

Like the boy in *The Little Prince*, the girl is sort of this timeless, undefined creature. She watches over Paris.

I like this model because it enabled me to take the very real, very complicated, wonder-Why do you think the story of Notre Dame ful and often-horrendous history of Paris and

Notre Dame and place it in a very unreal, mythical setting that I, and the reader, can grasp in a short book.

Another inspiration is Calvin and Hobbes by Bill Watterson.

His main character is a 6-year-old boy, but the boy, Calvin, doesn't talk or think in the way we expect children to behave. I wanted the little girl in my story to be like that: a child, but also capable of expressing profound ideas in grown-up ways.

What is your favorite part about the book? What makes this book stand out from other children's books?

I love the beginning, where the narrator meets the little girl.

I imagine it as such a peaceful setting: just the girl and the narrator and a cathedral.

I also love the moment where, as the cathedral is burning, we see that the spirits of people long dead have joined the people of Paris - their descendants - watching ... with them.

It's a powerful image, and it's the best representation of how I felt watching the cathedral burn. I thought of my French ancestors.

I didn't try to simplify the vocabulary or make it directly accessible to small children. In telling the story of Notre Dame, I didn't think, "Can a kid understand this sentence?" I thought, "Is this a story a kid might want to know?" The priority was capturing a vision of who this little girl was.

She doesn't speak like many children, and it's something I think children will like.

Illustrator Sara Ugolotti is incredible. Her illustrations make this book. Every bit of enjoyment anyone will get out of this story is 100% packaged in her illustrations. I'm so thrilled she agreed to be a part of this.

What did you learn in the process of studying the history of Notre Dame that you found particularly striking?

I learned a lot of broad history.

For example, I didn't realize the steeple (which burned, unfortunately) was a relatively recent addition.

Also, I did not know before how quickly the cathedral was built. I think it took about 200 years.

That just seems fast to me, given the technology of the day.

I learned that the original roof used wooden beams from a forest that no longer grows in France, of a species of tree that is no longer available; so when they reconstruct the roof, they won't be able to use the same wood.

A lot of those things are broad-strokes looks at the history that I tried to communicate, if not explicitly show, in the story.

How can interested readers get their hands on a copy or get involved with the book launch? Tell me about the give-back effort you are doing alongside the book launch.

We had a successful Kickstarter run over the summer for those who wanted to get their hands on a preorder.

The book will be ready for bookshelves by April, and another round of preorders will start shortly before that. Once the book is sold, it will be available online at outlets like Amazon, and, of course, we are getting it on bookshelves.

For every book sold, Bushel & Peck Publishing donates a book to children who don't have access to books.

It's something fairly unique about the company that I think people can get excited about.

ith Day by Day With St. Faustina: 365 Reflections, author Susan Tassone takes a giant leap into the Divine Mercy devotion based on the writings in St. Faustina's dairy.

Although this is Tassone's fourth book on St. Faustina — adding to St. Faustina Prayer Book for the Holy Souls in Purgatory, St. Faustina Prayer Book for the Conversion of Sinners, and St. Faustina Prayer Book for Adoration — the author has come up with yet another approach and perspective that can easily draw old and new readers into the Divine Mercy message.

The book offers a quote from St. Faustina and her diary for each day of the year, followed by a short "Reflection." Then a short prayer ties the quote and reflection together. Readers learn how to put that day's thought or revelation from St. Faustina into practice in daily life.

Throughout, Tassone offers catchy, clever descriptions.

The July 22 heading, quote and reflection focus on "A Niagara Falls of Mercy."

Prayer: "O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a font of mercy for us, I trust in You (diary, 84)."

Reflection: "We tend to think of a 'fount' as a quiet spring or delicate water fountain. But St. Faustina said Christ's Blood and water 'gushed' from His heart. In that sense, it's a Niagara Falls of love, a flooded river of grace, a tsunami of forgiveness. It can knock one over, sweep us away, and lift us higher and higher ... and closer and closer to Him."

Prayer: "Dear Jesus, I am at Your mercy. Thank God. Jesus, I trust in You."

Nov. 19 focuses on the theme of "Lovingly."

Quote: "[Jesus said to St. Faustina:] Daughter, I need sacrifice lovingly accomplished, because that alone has meaning for Me. Enormous indeed are the debts of the world which are due to Me; pure souls can pay them by their sacrifice, exercising mercy in spirit (diary, 1316)."

Reflection: "Why couldn't Jesus have just said, 'I need sacrifice accomplished'? Why did He have to include 'lovingly'? That pretty much eliminates doing it in a grumpy or sanctimonious way. We have to cover for others' 'debts.' It doesn't seem fair. But then again, thank God, God isn't fair. Imagine if He

gave us what we deserved!" March 24 focuses on "Designated Sufferer."

The reflection begins: "In baseball terms it's the 'designated hitter.' The player who doesn't play a position, but instead fills in the batting order for the pitcher. St. Faustina offers to be the 'designated sufferer,' accepting what 'other souls have refused to accept.' Was that because she liked "great and protracted" suffering? Of course not."

And Aug. 5, the feast of Our Lady of Mercy, focuses on "Apparent Obstacles": After the Blessed Virgin told Faustina, "I am Mother to you all, thanks to the unfathomable mercy of God. Most pleasing to Me is that soul which faithfully carries out the will of God. ... Be courageous. Do not fear apparent obstacles, but fix your gaze upon the Passion of My Son, and in this way you will be victorious (diary, 449)," comes the reflection. "What a comforting message of advice and encouragement Mary shares with her beloved daughter, or son. Do the will of God. Be brave. Don't be afraid of bumps in the road ... or mountains to climb. Remember Christ's Passion and you will win!"

"Winning," of course, means becoming a saint, and one of the book's aims is to help readers do so, by becoming "the person God is calling you to be as you grow in your love of Divine Mercy day by day."

#### Insights From the Author

A frequent guest on *EWTN Live* with Father Mitch Pacwa and EWTN's *Women of Grace*, and known as the "Purgatory Lady" for several books promoting prayers for

the holy souls, Tassone shared insights with the Register about the book. She noted that readers can use the book in a number of ways, including taking each daily quote from St. Faustina, the reflection and the prayer chronologically. But no one is obligated to follow

that course. Tassone mentioned that "you can open the book and read something in a bite-size piece, one nugget of wisdom at a time — a dayby-day dose of wisdom."

Or readers can "open to any page to be inspired. You can use this book as a daily devotional, to follow the liturgical seasons, too, or just pick it up and read as the Spirit leads you."

For instance, one month focuses on Lent and brings in lessons on sacrifice. Mary, of course, garners great attention for her month of May and "her relation to Faustina and us."

Highlighted, too, are feasts for Jesus, Mary and some saints.

Overall, Tassone didn't pick out "arbitrary quotes from the diary," but organized the quotes to help readers understand the "essential elements of the Divine Mercy message — trust, works of mercy, the image, the feast day, the chaplet and novena — but [also] the major themes" according to the "key themes repeated over and over again throughout the diary."

The key themes deal with Holy Communion, confession, adoration, praying for the dying, doing God's will, the love God has for us, the Trinity, devotion to our Blessed Mother, the value of suffering and sacrifice, and devotion to the holy souls in purgatory.

And Tassone fits everything together as a "solid answer for those asking how to apply Faustina's teaching and example in daily life."

She explained that the inspiration for this book came about in several ways. Among them, the Daughters of St. Paul informed her that people came into their stores sharing how they've read the diary, but "they don't know what to do with it." The Divine Mercy Shrine staff also told her that people were asking for a "day-by-day book" focusing on St. Faustina's diary.

#### Meant for Today's World

Day by Day With St. Faustina answers those needs and is especially relevant today.

more for our time," Tassone emphasized. "Her message seems perfectly suited to the issues roiling our country. So many of us are angry, sadly often with people we love, because they do not see the world as we want them to see it. St. Faustina gives us a path to follow. She says: Follow God's will. Be merciful with yourself and others. Forgive yourself and others. Share dis-

agreements without becoming disagreeable. We can all turn to the Divine Mercy message for advice and comfort."

"The Divine Mercy message is the same as it was in St. Faustina's time," Tassone added. "It applies to us now more than ever. The Lord wants to remind us of his infinite mercy and love. He told Faustina these are his greatest attributes."

She pointed out a favorite quote from Faustina: "When I received Holy Communion, I said to Him, 'Jesus, I thought about You so many times last night,' and Jesus answered me, 'And I thought of you before I called you into being.' 'Jesus, in what way were You thinking about me?' 'In terms of admitting you to My eternal happiness''' (diary, 1292).

Faustina "invites us to learn how to live the message of conversion, to avoid purgatory and to become more faithful in praying for others, living and deceased," Tassone explained. Tassone wanted the book to "show how to apply these fundamentals in your life" through the diary's "major teachings, insights and revelations," and Faustina's encouraging us "to do God's will, fulfill our mission on earth, and trust in him."

#### Spiritual Growth

As Tassone explained, overall, this book is designed to help readers "grow closer to Christ in the Eucharist; develop a stronger, deeper daily prayer life with the help of the angels and saints; get along better with others; trust God more; let the realities of heaven, hell and purgatory influence your choices now; love the Blessed Mother even more, and let her love draw you closer to her Son; use your suffering to help others, including souls in purgatory; understand and take advantage of the spiritual powerhouse that is the sacrament of reconciliation; and become a person of mercy" by learning from St. Faustina.

Speaking of mercy, Tassone collected all the promises of Jesus, the Divine Mercy, that he made connected with the devotions in the book's first appendix. It's a treasure of comfort, encouragement and inspiration.

For this author, her hope and prayer is that readers "take St. Faustina's message to heart as we read it, reflect on it, pray it, and live it, day by day, with St. Faustina."
